BECAUSE OF THE NUMBER OF MEMBERS, AND BECAUSE OF THE exceptionally long terms some have served, Mount Vernon has one of the outstanding School Boards in the State. Mr. P. J. Holte has served 31 continuous years on his local Board and 15 years on the present Union Board, its entire life. Mr. H. H. Anderson has served 26 years on his local Board and 14 years on the Union Board. The other members have served from one to twelve years, the total service of all members being ninetynine years.

The Board is organized on the plan of six permanent committees of five members each. To the Financial Committee are referred all matters pertaining to the preparation of the budget and the financial standing of the District. The Health Committee supervises the health of the students through attention to the sanitary conditions around the building and on the school busses. The Education Committee attends to all matters affecting the members of the Faculty, the course of study, and the educational policies of the Union District.

The problem of transporting 305 students in six school busses more than 300,000 student miles during the year, is solved by the Transportation Committee. Care and repair of the \$225,000 school plant and the 13 acre campus is assigned to the Building and Grounds Committee. The Junior College, which comes under the sponsorship of the Directors of the Union District, is governed by the Junior College Committee. Matters decided upon by any of the six committees are usually accepted by the entire Board at their regular meetings.





The boys have successfully staged two "smokers" this year. The profits from these are used for football equipment.



ALTHOUGH THE SCORES DO NOT INDICATE IT, THE FOOTBALL season was a successful one, in that future material was developed. Eight games were played, four of them on the new turf field, which was made possible by Skagit County Sportsmen.

The first game of the season ended in a victory for Fairhaven. Although the Bulldogs outplayed the Bears during the whole game, Fairhaven capitalized on the breaks and won 7-6. The next game with Stanwood proved to be a "pushover" for Mount Vernon, the Bulldogs emerging victorious 12-0. The first game on the new turf field proved to be a "walkaway" for Whatcom, the Redskins winning 33-0. The fourth game of the season was with Arlington, that team winning 25-6. However, it was in this game that Coach Heaman discovered the winning combination. Then there was a forced lay off of two weeks because of John Minahan's contracting infantile paralysis.

The Bulldogs licked the Wild Cats from Oak Harbor 25-0. The next victory was won from the Anacortes Seahawks 7-0. On the sixth play of the game Bob Cushen, Mount Vernon halfback, ran 66 yards for the winning score. The hardest game to lose was that one played with Burlington. The Bulldogs outplayed their opponents three quarters of the game, but were defeated 14-12. The Sedro-Woolley Cubs won the Thanksgiving day game 14-0. The first score came when the Cubs blocked a kick on Mount Vernon's 20-yard line.

Captain "Wigs" Hanson, center, received all-county honors as did Singer, a tackle, and Bouslog, an end. Mount Vernon players chosen for second all-county positions were: Cooper, tackle; Wilkins, end; Davis, guard; F. Shumway, fullback; Cushen, halfback; Brickey, halfback.

Those lost to the team because of graduation and the age rule are Brickey, Hanson, Hedlund, Melvin Bouslog, and F. Shumway.

Under the leadership of Coach Heaman, the basketball season started immediately after the close of football season. The turnout was large but inexperienced. Coach Heaman put his boys to work in fine fashion and with several weeks of practice the Bulldogs opened the season with a win against Concrete.

They lost the next game to Anacortes but the boys didn't lose their spirit, and as a result won a thrilling game from Burlington. The first time they met them on the floor, Dan Ellinger shot two longs at the close of the game to score the winning points. In the County tournament game with Burlington, Mount Vernon was behind 5 points with 2 minutes to go. Two baskets were made in one minute and Ben Martin slipped in the winning points just as the gun sounded.

Some of the outstanding players were Walter Boyes, who was an all-county guard, and Mervin Bouslog, a second all-county center. Lettermen graduating are Windus and Brickey. With such men back as Bouslog, Martin, Ellinger, Warner, Shepherd, Treese and Hutchison, all lettermen, Coach Heaman has hopes of a championship team for Mount Vernon next year.

TENNIS, A MAJOR SPORT IN MOUNT VERNON HIGH SCHOOL, HAS become the most popular sport for both boys and girls. The 1935 Bulldog squad has had an active season which ended with the boys showing fine tennis and good sportsmanship at the county and district trounament. The courts have been improved and kept in good shape all year.

The girls' team, coached by Miss Smith, started with a difficult schedule but they won a number of matches as the season progressed. Betty Harris, Ruth Ellinger, Anne Smith and Marion Lindbloom were the outstanding players and Pauline Allen successfully managed the matches.

Mr. Lang's team of boys played matches with Anacortes, Sedro-Woolley, Everett, Burlington and La Conner. The boys winning the greater number of their games were Chuck Boyd, Marvin Johnson, Dan Ellinger, Ben Martin and Ervin Warner. Mount Vernon took first and second places in the county tournament and made a good showing in the district tournament.

The track team of '35 consisted of only two lettermen, Brickey and Cushen, and much green material. The first meet, a relay carnival, took place at Sedro-Woolley where the Bulldogs failed to place. At the triangular meet with Edison and Sedro-Woolley they chalked up a total of 16 points.

At the quadrangular meet with Whatcom, Burlington and Anacortes, Mount Vernon entered four men who earned 19 points. Windus, McMillan, Brickey, Ellinger, Berger and Cushen were entered at the County Preliminaries. Brickey won the 440 and Cushen placed second in the 220, putting them in the district meet at Sedro-Woolley. Those winning letters were: Brickey, Ellinger, Cushen and Chester Windus.

Coaches Moore and Appelgate deserve much credit for their loyal support to the team. They are in a large part responsible for the improvement in the track and field.

Coach Kolkana opened the 1935 baseball season with a turnout of thirty boys. There was only one letterman among the group. After two weeks of practice the boys were cut to a squad of eighteen. On April 29, they opened their first game with Sedro-Woolley. The game was bitterly fought, with Sedro coming out on the long end of the score 3-1. Smarting from the defeat, the boys avenged themselves the following week against Hamilton with a victory of 4-3. Next, the team whipped Burlington at Burlington by a score of 9-5. Other games on the Bulldog schedule were with Oak Harbor, Concrete and Anacortes.

With the team composed entirely of underclassmen, there should be a well-rounded squad for next year's pennant race.




